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### VIRGINIA COMMONWEALTH UNIVERSITY FY 2017-2018 UNIVERSITY BUDGET PLAN

### Highlights

#### **Executive Summary**

VCU's FY 2017-18 budget reflects Virginia Commonwealth University's continued commitment to student success and academic excellence despite on-going declines in the public financing of higher education. As detailed in the following pages, VCU remains focused on and dedicated to providing a high-quality education for all students by ensuring access, affordability and timely completion. VCU is among the leaders in Virginia's public four-year institutions:

- Graduating over 16% of total in-state graduates among four-year public institutions.
- Enrolling over 14% of in-state, first-time freshman among four-year public institutions (Fall 2016), including 35% first generation students.
- Serving under-represented populations including those with greatest financial need (67% of in-state undergraduates in Fall 2015)\*.

Significant progress has been made in accelerating four and six-year graduation rates. Success in this area is attributed to increased financial aid (institutional and externally funded), targeted efforts in advising, increased faculty hiring ensuring availability of high-demand courses, as well as the continued success of the new market based credit hour tuition program (implemented in Fall 2013).

In the upcoming year (FY 2017-18), the Governor and General Assembly addressed on-going state revenue shortfalls by implementing further across-the-board reductions for all agencies including public colleges and universities. While these cuts are very significant, it is important to note that VCU's emphasis on access and service to Virginia students resulted in a slightly lower reduction. Reductions at VCU totaled \$11.1 million including:

- \$8.0 million in a permanent General Funds reduction.
- \$2.1 million loss in one-time support related to VRS.
- \$1.0 million in continued loss of the aforementioned rebates.

Action by the Legislature also provided for:

- \$4.0 million funded by the State for a planned 3% salary increase for faculty and staff.
- \$2.0 million in increased funding for student equity and access.
- \$4.4 million in a continuation of funding from last year for financial aid.

### **Key University Allocations in the Proposed Budget – Institutional Unavoidable Costs & Highest Priority Needs:**

The FY 2017-2018 budget includes:

- \$5.1 million in funding for financial aid, including increased state funding of \$2.0 million for equity and access.
- \$4.1 million for faculty recruitment and retention in support of student progress and research initiatives. This includes additional faculty hires to address enrollment needs in the College of Humanities and Sciences and the School of Engineering, as well as University-wide mandated faculty promotions.
- \$13.4 million in funding for both a 3% salary increase for faculty and staff, and anticipated increases in the overall fringe rate. This need will be partially offset by funding from savings from the prior year's deferred salary increase of \$3.3 million, as well as state support estimated at \$4.0 million.
- \$2.8 million in funding to address operational and academic contractual costs ranging from facilities maintenance to library journal expenses to funding ongoing deferred maintenance needs. These expenses are partially offset from planned utility cost savings of \$1.0 million.

To address these new needs and sustain current operations in light of the State budget reductions, the University will implement both limited tuition and fee rate increases for in-state resident undergraduate students of 3.8% (see Section III for details), and a required budget reduction of \$3.9 million.

The budget plan is based on the FY 2017–2018 tuition and mandatory fee rate proposals in Tab III, and as summarized on the next page.

#### **Sources and Uses**

Table A presents the FY 2017-2018 operating budget by major fund source and program classification. Budgeted revenue is derived from two sources – state general fund appropriations and a variety of nongeneral fund revenues.

State general fund appropriations come from state revenues appropriated by the General Assembly. General fund appropriations are used primarily to support Educational and General (E&G) programs, Student Financial Assistance, and Research.

Nongeneral funds describe revenues raised by VCU from the following recurring sources:

- Educational and General student tuition and fees;
- Grants and Contracts (revenues from federal, state and local agencies, as well as private industry, sponsored projects and student financial aid);
- Sales and Services (revenues received by organizational units for goods and services, such as University housing and food services, University Fee/Student Health Fee, and other Sales and Services);
- Gifts and Investment Income (private money received from donors, interest earned on the University's cash investment pool, and endowment payouts from the University's affiliated foundations); and
- Other Revenues (revenues from dentistry clinical earnings, dentistry practice plans, medical clinical earnings, and MCV Associated Physicians revenues).

Nongeneral fund revenues support a variety of purposes, including E&G programs, auxiliary enterprises, sponsored research activities, student financial assistance, and other programs.

**Grants and Contracts:** Grants and Contracts are sources from sponsored programs, including research projects, training grants, and similar activities funded by a variety of sponsoring governmental and private agencies for specific purposes and are estimated at \$210.7 million for FY 2017-2018. In addition, the budget includes \$31.7 million in student grants for student financial assistance for a total of \$242.4 million.

**Auxiliary Enterprises:** Auxiliary Enterprises provide a variety of goods and services to students, faculty and staff, including: residential and food services, student health programs, parking and transportation, student recreational programs, student centers, bookstores, and intercollegiate athletics. Auxiliary Enterprise programs receive no state taxpayer support and are funded through user fees, sales, and mandatory student fees. For FY 2017-2018, sources supporting auxiliary programs total about \$148.1 million. There will be no increase in the University Fee for FY 2017-2018, which supports many of the University's auxiliary enterprises.

Auxiliary Enterprises accumulate reserves in order to maintain facilities, finance renovation and construction costs, and address unanticipated costs. A full accounting of sources and uses is detailed behind Tab II under Auxiliary Enterprises.

Capital Reserves and Other: A total of \$8.6 million is budgeted University-wide for contingencies in FY 2017-2018. The largest contingencies are budgeted at \$3.2 million in auxiliary enterprises, \$4.3 million in E&G programs, and \$1.1 million in Facilities and Administrative Costs. These contingencies provide a pool of funds that may be accumulating to fund debt service, or allocated during the year to address unanticipated cost increases and other one-time funding needs.

The FY 2017-2018 budget plan projects a budget balance of \$6.3 million, primarily attributable to the need for auxiliary enterprises to maintain required reserves and accumulate balances for equipment and facility maintenance and upgrade.

A more detailed discussion of the FY 2017-2018 budget by fund group (Educational and General Programs, Sponsored Programs, Facilities and Administrative Cost Recoveries, Auxiliary Enterprises, University Funds, Student Financial Assistance, and Hospital Services) is included in Tab II.

### Virginia Commonwealth University FY 2017-2018 University Budget Plan Educational and General Programs

#### Overview

Educational and General (E&G) programs include all of the University's instructional programs and related support services. Revenue is derived primarily from student tuition, state general fund appropriations, and instructional fees.

#### **Highlights**

A summary of E&G sources and uses, which total \$617.8 million, is presented in Table A.

The FY 2017-2018 E&G budget plan is focused on fulfilling the strategic initiatives as set forth in *Quest for Distinction*. Based on the commitments and goals established in VCU's Six-Year Plan, key priorities such as the following have been addressed:

- Improved student recruitment, retention, and scholarships;
- Strengthen academic programs;
- Recruit and retain outstanding faculty, staff and senior leadership; and salary increases for faculty and staff.

Available funding for FY 2017-18 includes \$2.0 million of state general fund support for equity and access, estimated salary increase for faculty and staff, and other actions of the General Assembly. The budget also includes an \$8.0 million in general fund reductions imposed in FY 2017-18.

The decrease in sales and service and public service is due mostly to a decline in revenue and services in the dental clinics. Additional funding for institutional student aid includes \$2.1 million to increase two existing University merit programs for students with financial need plus an additional \$3.0 million in need-based student financial aid from a reallocation of E&G resources.

The E&G budget allocates approximately 76% of its resources to the basic missions of instruction, research, public service and support for students and faculty in accomplishing those missions. Another 9% of the E&G budget is allocated to maintaining the physical plant, and 15% of the resources allocated to institutional support.

Table B presents a summary of FY 2017-2018 changes in state general fund support for the University's core operating programs.

Table C presents a summary of changes in projected tuition and fee revenue above the FY 2016-2017 budget, including enrollment growth, tuition rate changes, and other program and fee adjustments.

Table D presents changes to the FY 2016-2017 Budget Plan expense budget, including unavoidable costs and investments in new initiatives that further strengthen VCU's realization of its strategic plan and goals.

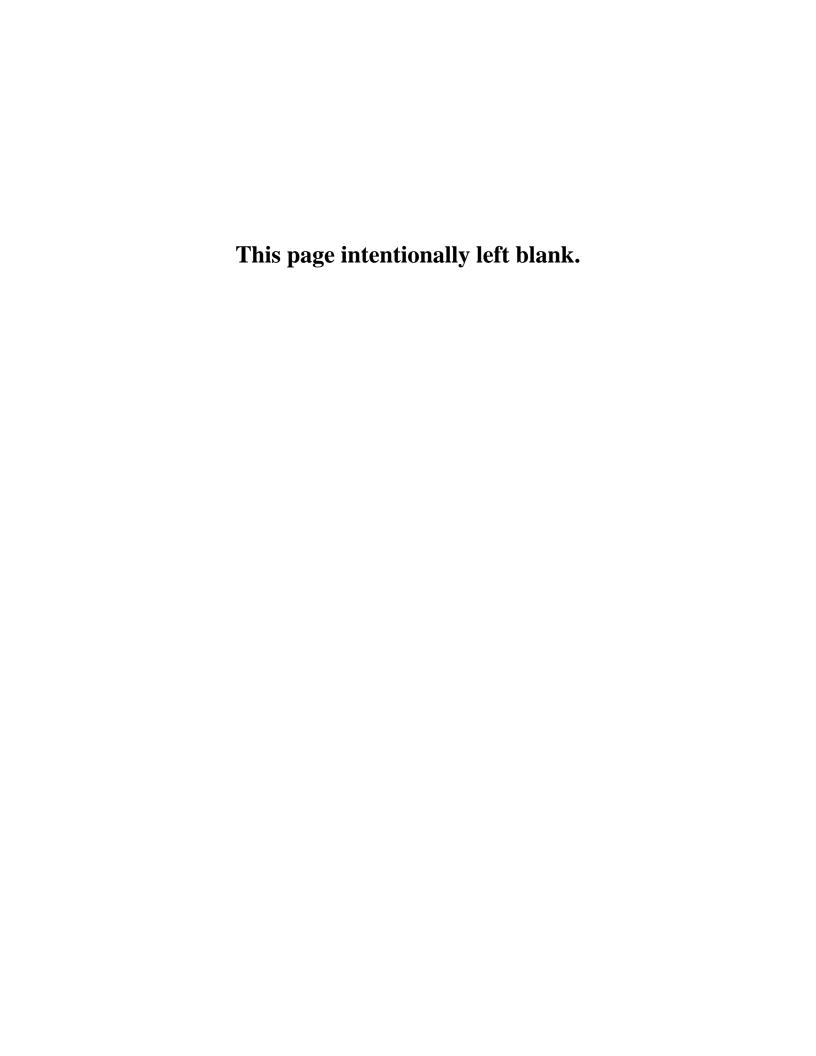

### Virginia Commonwealth University FY 2017-2018 University Budget Plan Sponsored Programs Facilities and Administrative Cost Recoveries

#### Overview

Sponsored programs includes research projects, training grants, and similar activities funded by revenue received from governmental and private agencies for specific purposes. Sponsored programs are administered in accordance with the terms of the applicable grant or contract and the agency awarding the funds. Because grant awards often apply to more than one year and expenses may occur over more than one year, revenues and expenditures for sponsored programs in a given year differ significantly from awards.

#### **Highlights**

The budget plan assumes revenues and expenditures of approximately \$224.7 million in FY 2017-2018. Table A details direct research activity as well as administrative overhead and other support costs associated with grants, which are known as Facilities and Administrative Cost Recoveries (FACR).

Direct costs in Table A include state appropriation funding for research under the State's Higher Education Research Initiative, consisting of \$1,162,500 for research in bioengineering and regenerative medicine and \$12,500,000 for cancer research. Table A also includes \$350,000 to support the Parkinson's and Movement Disorders Center.

Table B summarizes FACR sources and uses. For FY 2017-2018, total FACR revenue is estimated at \$40 million. Revenue estimates are based on projected levels of grants and contracts, direct expenditures, and the FY 2017-2018 recovery rate of 55.0% for on-campus federal facilities and administrative costs.

The Commonwealth has in place a long-standing requirement that a portion of an institution's total FACR be included in its E&G revenues. These funds are used to meet administrative costs, research or research related requirements, and principal and interest on bonds issued by or for the institution. The revenue portion budgeted to E&G for FY 2017-2018 is \$8,221,500, and is shown on Tables A and B.

Table C lists budgeted FACR uses. FACR revenue is allocated using a combination of set percentage allocations; fixed commitments such as support for research institutes and centers, graduate scholarships, and fellowships; capital requirements for debt service and facilities maintenance; a contingency fund; and support to the University Research Incentive Plan. The remaining balance after these allocations is directed to the Research Pool for the Vice President for Research and Innovation.

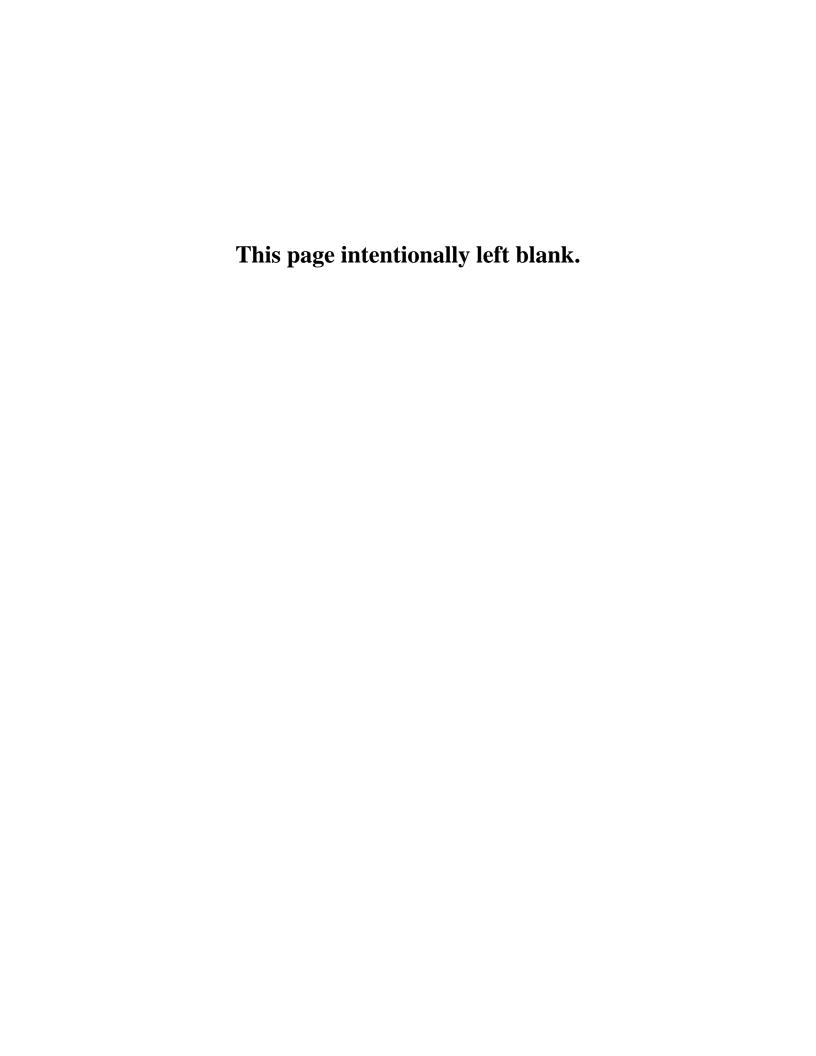

### Virginia Commonwealth University FY 2017-2018 University Budget Plan Auxiliary Enterprise Programs

### Overview

An auxiliary enterprise is a self-supporting unit that exists to serve students, faculty, or staff through the sale of goods or services. Auxiliary enterprises include intercollegiate athletics, residential facilities, student centers, student gymnasiums, student development programs, student health services, food service facilities, bookstores, print shops, telecommunications, and parking and transportation.

Auxiliary enterprises are funded through user fees (e.g., dorm charges), revenue from sales and services (e.g., book sales, basketball tickets), and mandatory fees (University Fee and Student Health Fee). Auxiliary enterprise activities are required to be self-supporting. This means that the state does not provide any support, either for operating costs, maintenance, or construction of facilities. Accordingly, auxiliary enterprises must accumulate reserves to meet unanticipated revenue shortfalls or expenditure needs, maintain facilities, and finance renovations and construction costs.

### **Highlights**

The budget for FY 2017-2018 projects sources of \$148.2 million and uses of approximately \$142.2 million.

Within Sources, there was an overall increase in additional Sales and Services from Athletics, Residential and Parking and Transportation. The decrease in the Board Plan sources reflects less students on the board plans due to the ongoing reconstruction of the Gladding dorm. The increase for Gifts and Interest Earnings is attributed to increased donor gifts for Intercollegiate Athletics. The decrease in Use of Balances reflects a reduction in funds needed in FY 2017-18 for projects completed in FY2016-17 among various auxiliaries. For additional details, Table B presents a summary of revenue by source and by specific auxiliary program.

The increase reflected in Uses is largely attributed to a 3 percent salary increase for both classified and faculty as authorized by the General Assembly.

For FY 2017-2018 Auxiliary programs plan to add \$6.0 million to reserves for future needs in athletic and dining facilities; retail shops; telecommunications and steam plant replacement projects; and other planned improvements.

### Virginia Commonwealth University FY 2017-2018 University Budget Plan University Funds

#### Overview

University Funds include both restricted and unrestricted funds for which the sources of revenue are gifts to University departments, investment earnings, endowment income and foundation support, and other transfers. University Funds are not included in funds appropriated by the General Assembly. Gifts are traditionally made through affiliated foundations and are made available for use by departments for various expenditures. Although gifts made directly to the University are generally for very specific purposes, they can vary significantly from year to year.

The University currently has approximately 2,000 University Funds indexes from which expenditures are managed by deans, directors, and department heads. As such, the University Funds budget reflects an overall estimate of revenues and expenditures based on trend analysis, therefore has potential for tremendous variability, rather than an allocation of resources available centrally to the University.

### **Highlights**

The budget plan projects revenues and expenditures of approximately \$42.7 million in FY 2017-2018.

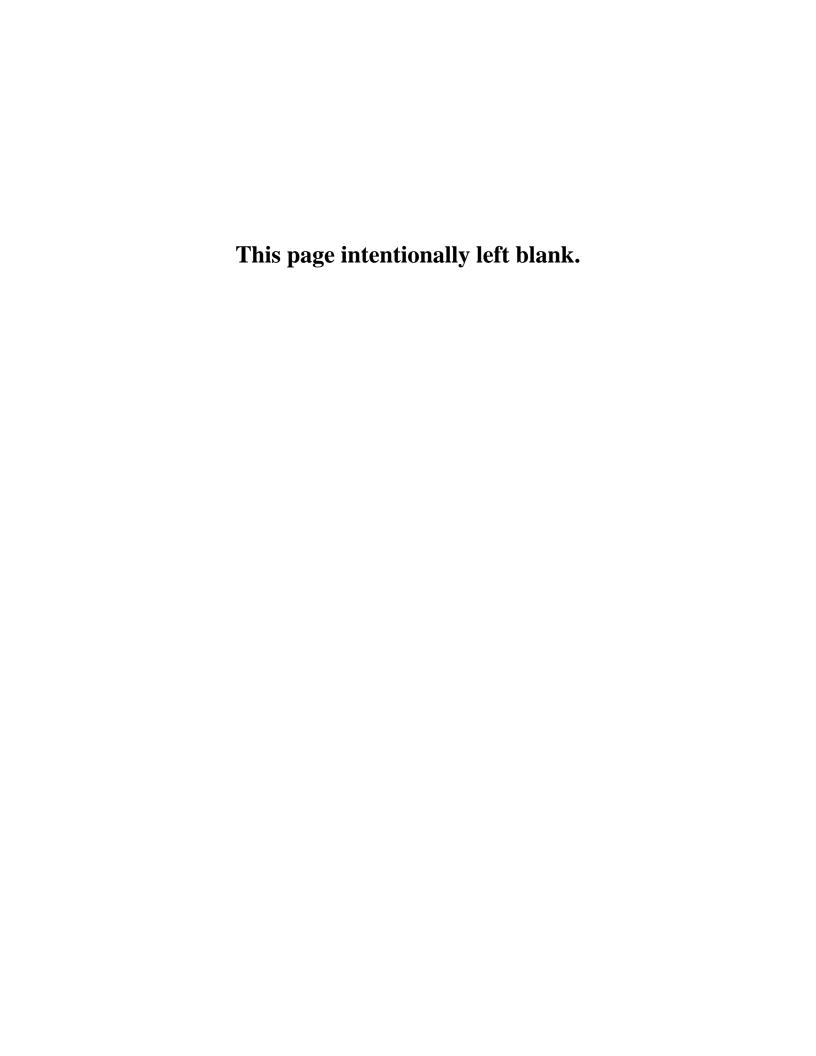
Key assumptions regarding the FY 2017-2018 budget are as follows:

- The majority of gifts are received by the University's affiliated foundations and then recorded in the *endowment income and foundation support* revenue category when transferred to the University for expenditure.
- Investment Income has a lower planned distribution due to prior funding commitments ending in FY 2017-2018.

#### Virginia Commonwealth University FY 2017-2018 University Budget Plan Student Financial Assistance

#### Overview

Student Financial Assistance includes scholarships, grants and fellowships awarded to students without requiring work or service, and work-related programs. Amounts for the Federal Work Study Program and Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants are federal matching funds. Tuition waivers and the undergraduate scholars program are excluded.

#### **Highlights**

Sources and uses of Student Financial Assistance funds are budgeted at \$131.1 million in FY 2017-2018 through the Student Financial Assistance program budget. This includes \$61.8 million in Federal and State funded aid and \$69.3 million in aid funded by all university sources (see Table A). This is an increase in total aid of \$9.8 million of which \$1.1 million is anticipated from Federal and State resources and \$8.7 million from university resources. Significant changes from FY 2016-17 include:

- An anticipated increase in the Pell Grant Program bringing the maximum individual Pell Grant award to \$5,920, an increase of \$105.
- Additional state general fund support of \$163,146 in graduate fellowship through the Virginia Student Financial Assistance Program.
- An additional \$3,000,000 for aid funded from Nongeneral funds from Educational and General (E&G) programs bringing the total to \$14,002,320. This additional aid will be transferred to provide need based financial assistance to help ensure recruitment, retention and graduation of students with financial need.
- The Virginia Merit awards will also be increased, and in Fall 2017 (FY2018), the scholarship amount will be \$3,000 per award with approximately 725 additional scholarships to be awarded to a 3rd cohort of new, incoming in-state freshmen. This increase of \$1.8 million will bring the total funding to \$6,398,000.
- An additional \$255,500 has been added in Fall 2017 (FY 2018) for the 4th cohort of in-state students receiving the Presidential Quest merit scholarships, bringing the total to \$1,218,000.
- The planned increase in Athletic Scholarship expenditures of \$.5 million will be funded mainly from increased fundraising, ticket sales and NCAA revenue-sharing income.
- Increased financial assistance support in University funds of \$2.1million for scholarship and fellowships.

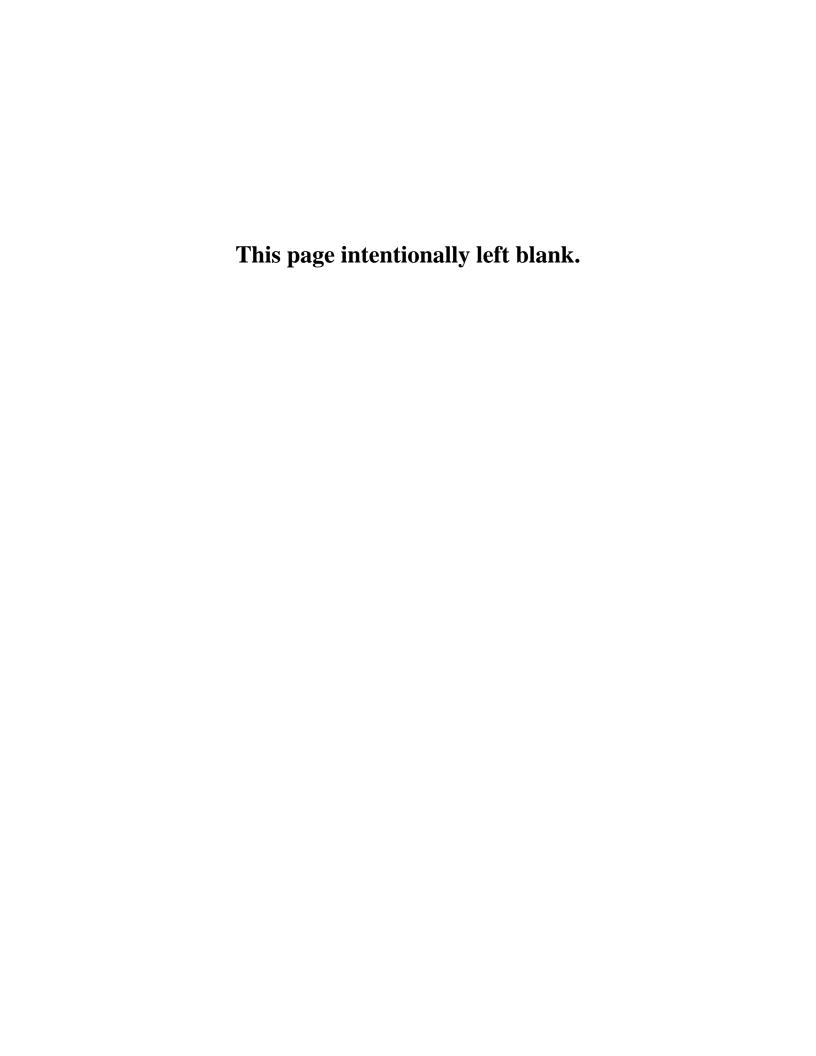

#### Virginia Commonwealth University FY 2017-2018 University Budget Plan Hospital Services

#### Overview

Hospital Services represents University revenue and expenditure for services provided by the University to the VCU Health System and related activities. This accounting methodology was initiated with the conversion of the Medical College of Virginia Hospitals from state agency status to an authority. At that time, a new state program, Hospital Services, was assigned to the University for recording this activity.

The Hospital Services budget includes the Clinical, Educational, and Research Services Agreement (CERSA) between the Health Sciences schools and the VCU Health System. The Hospital Services budget also includes funding from the Operations and Services Agreement (OSA) for a variety of administrative services provided to the VCU Health System by the University.

#### **Highlights**

A summary of sources and uses, estimated at \$27 million in FY 2017-2018, is presented in Table A. The growth in service cost for FY 2017-2018 over FY 2016-2017 is primarily related to the increase in personnel cost due to four new positions being added by the University and a three percent salary increase, authorized by the General Assembly. The growth in the CERSA agreements are due to two positions being added in the VP for Health Sciences Office and recruitment costs associated with the hiring of these positions.

Key assumptions related to the FY 2017-2018 Hospital Services budget are detailed below:

- Rental income, estimated at \$1.4 million in FY 2017-2018, is based on a master agreement for space leased by the University to the VCU Health System on a short-term basis. Payments for long-term leases of facilities by the VCU Health System are set at \$1 per year or the amount of debt service, whichever is greater. In general, short-term rental rates are set at the lower of cost or market rates.
- The VCU Health System leases space from the University and the University contracts with the Health System through the OSA for operation and maintenance services for the leased space and other Health System facilities. A portion of rental income paid by the VCU Health System is used as a reserve for maintenance on these facilities.
- In addition to the CERSA and the OSA, the Hospital Services budget includes approximately \$500,000 for services provided to other hospitals and clinics.
- Services are also provided through a Clinical Operations and Services Agreement (COSA) between the Hospitals and MCV Physicians. These services are not reported in the Hospital Services program and include medical administration, clinical operations, and graduate medical education supervision. The Hospitals provide mission support payments to MCV Physicians through a Mission Support Agreement. This agreement was established as a result of the shared missions and purposes of the Hospitals and MCV Physicians and the on-going funding needs of MCV Physicians to fulfill such shared missions and purposes.

- The block schedule undergraduate tuition model, applied to undergraduate students entering VCU prior to Fall 2013, will be discontinued beginning FY 2019 (Fall 2018). All undergraduate students will be charged based on the credit model at that time.
- Tuition charges will increase from FY 2016-2017 rates by \$404 for block schedule resident undergraduates, \$1,129 for block schedule nonresident undergraduates, \$490 for resident masters students, \$1,043 for nonresident masters students, \$404 for resident doctoral students and \$897 for nonresident doctoral students.
- Tuition charges for credit hour undergraduates will increase from FY 2016-2017 rates by \$17 per credit for residents and \$46 per credit for nonresidents. The full per credit charge will apply to the first 14 credits, and a 50% discount will be applied for credits 15 and above. Tuition charges for a resident undergraduate taking 15 credits per semester will increase \$494, and for a nonresident undergraduate taking 15 credits will increase \$1,334.
- Block schedule undergraduates enrolled in 12-18 credit hours during a semester pay a flat rate. Graduates enrolled in 9-15 credit hours during a semester pay a flat rate.

- The number of credit hours for which a student may enroll before a course overload fee is charged for block schedule undergraduate students will continue at 18 credit hours per semester and 15 credit hours per semester for graduate students.
- Virginia public institutions of higher education are required to charge a Capital Outlay Fee to nonresident students. The revenue is used to reimburse the Commonwealth for a portion of the debt service on bonds issued under the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Program and for debt service on bond issues used to finance equipment purchases through the Higher Education Equipment Trust Fund (HEETF). The fee will increase by \$35 from the 2016-2017 rate.
- The following fees will not increase for FY 2017-2018.
  - o University Fee
  - o Technology Fee
  - o Library Fee
  - Health Service Fee
  - Student Activity Fee (Monroe Park Campus)
  - Student Government Fee (MCV Campus)
- A representative room charge for double occupancy in University housing will increase by \$200. Rates for all housing options are summarized in section III on pages 61 and 62.
- The rate for a 200 Swipes with \$300 per semester in Dining Dollars will increase by \$68 for the academic year. Rates for all meal plans are summarized in section III on page 63.

#### **Proposed Program Specific Tuition and Fees**

- Tuition and mandatory fees for Medicine First Professional students will increase by between \$380 and \$2,065 depending on student residency and year, as presented in the School of Medicine section.
  - First-professional medical students receiving their third and fourth year of undergraduate medical education on the VCU School of Medicine INOVA Campus pay a unique campus fee, the revenue from which is used to support student recreation, student health, and student counseling programs. This fee is in lieu of the University Fee, the Student Health Fee, and the MCV Campus Student Government Fee. The INOVA Campus Fee will remain at \$1,297 for FY 2017-2018.
- Dentistry First Professional tuition and mandatory fees will increase between \$2,583 and \$5,803 depending on student residency and year. Changes in Dental Instrument Rental and Instrument Kit Purchase Fees vary depending on student program and year as presented in the School of Dentistry section. The clinical electronic health record laptop fee, added in FY2014-2015, has decreased \$51 due to contract pricing.
- Tuition and mandatory fee charges for the First Professional PharmD Program will increase \$646 for resident students and \$966 for nonresident students. First-professional pharmacy students receiving their third year of education on the VCU INOVA Campus pay a unique campus fee, the revenue from which is used to support student recreation, student health, and student counseling programs. This fee is in lieu of the University Fee, the Student Health Fee, and the MCV Campus Student Government Fee. The Pharmacy INOVA Campus Fee did not increase for FY 2017-2018.

- Tuition for Qatar Ministry of Education students studying in Qatar will equal twice the published VCU student nonresident tuition rate. The comprehensive fee (previously the mandatory book fee) remains at \$895 for FY 2017-2018.
- The Tuition and Fees section reflects all charges in dollars.
- In addition to the tuition and fee charges identified, the President or his designee(s) may set tuition and fee charges for courses offered by the University. The rates shall be consistent with the University's mission, the overall tuition and fee schedule, and state requirements.
- Specific tuition and fee charges for FY 2017-2018 are presented in the following sections.

Full-time graduate students are also charged at the part-time per credit hour rate for each additional hour exceeding 15 credit hours per semester in which the student is enrolled.

See the schedule of part-time student charges for per credit hour rates. Students enrolled in overload courses are charged the additional per credit hour amount for tuition. The overload fee does not apply to students in first professional programs or other programs which specifically require the student to enroll in courses that exceed the applicable maximum number of credit hours.

#### **Other Charges**

In addition to the tuition and fee charges identified herein, the President or his designee(s) may set tuition and fee charges for courses offered by the University. These rates shall be consistent with the University's mission, the overall tuition and fee schedule, and State requirements.

## Virginia Commonwealth University FY 2017-2018 University Budget Plan

#### **Glossary of Budget Terms**

#### A. Revenue

Budgeted revenue is derived from either State appropriated general or nongeneral funds.

1. **General Funds (GF)** General funds is a term used in the State Appropriation Act to

describe State tax dollars. State tax dollars support Educational

and General Programs and Student Financial Assistance

Programs.

2. Nongeneral Funds (NGF)

Nongeneral funds is a term used to describe all funds raised exclusively by VCU to support its budgeted expenditures.

Nongeneral funds are derived from the following sources:

a. Student Tuition and Fees Revenue from the tuition and fee charges described.

b. Grants and Contracts

Reimbursement of expenditures from Federal, State, and local agencies sponsoring projects at the

University.

c. Gifts

A gift to the University can be in the form of cash, securities, tangible personal property (works of art, antiques, books, etc.), intangible personal property (copyrights, patents, contract, royalties, etc.), and real

estate.

d. Endowment Income

Endowment funds require the principal to be maintained in perpetuity. The income from the endowment can generally be used for any purpose, unless certain restrictions have been imposed by the donor.

e. Foundation Support

Revenue received from the VCU Foundation, the MCV Foundation, the VCU Real Estate Foundation, the VCU School of Engineering Foundation, or the VCU School of Business Foundation.

f. Income from Trust Funds Income earned from a trust held by the University in a trustee capacity. The income is used for University operations.

g. Investment Income

Income generated from the University's investment

securities.

h. Sales and Services Revenue from charges made by a specific organizational unit for the delivery of goods and services.

#### 3. Tuition and Fees

Tuition and fee policy for Virginia's colleges and universities is set by the Governor and the General Assembly through the Appropriation Act. The Board of Visitors approves tuition and fee rates. Tuition and fee charges at VCU fall under one of the following categories below.

**a. Tuition** Tuition categories:

#### 1. Credit Hour

A per credit rate structure is used for all full-time (defined as 12 or more credit hours) undergraduate students enrolled beginning the fall semester 2013. A 50% discount is applied to all credits 15 and above. Rate varies based upon residency status and instructional program.

#### 2. Block Schedule

Undergraduate full-time block schedule students (defined as students enrolled prior to fall semester 2013) are charged a fixed rate for up to 18 credits. Credits over 18 are assessed an overload rate equal to the part-time rate per credit. Rate varies based upon residency status and instructional program. This model will be discontinued starting FY 2019 (Fall 2018). All undergraduate students will be charged using the credit structure from the beginning of FY 2019 forward.

#### 3. Graduate

A fixed rate is charged to graduate and professional students based upon instructional program, residency status, and the level of enrollment.

**b. Fees** Charges in excess of tuition, which is related to a specific program, or set of programs. Fees at VCU include:

## 1. Technology Fee

This is a required fee for all undergraduate, graduate, and first-professional students on both campuses. The fee is used to provide for a student's technological needs and to support University-wide technological initiatives. Student input is a critical component in determining the use of the revenue derived from the technology fee.

## 2. University Fee

This is a required fee for all full- and part-time students on both campuses. Full-time students pay a flat rate. Part-time students pay a per credit hour rate. This fee is used by the University to support recreational sports facilities, the Student Commons, campus development, career and counseling centers, student disability and student service center, intercollegiate athletics, and other programs.

#### 3. Health Service Fee

This is a required fee for all full-time students on both campuses. Part-time students may participate on an optional basis but must pay the full fee. The health service fee covers unlimited visits to University Student Health Services for the diagnosis and treatment of acute and chronic illnesses. The student health fee does not cover accidental injury and hospitalization. Fee revenues are used to cover operating costs for University Student Health Services.

# 4. Student Activity Fee/ Student Government Fee

This is a required fee for all full-time and part-time students. The fee supports activities scheduled throughout the academic year, such as concerts, plays, student organizations, and publications.

#### 5. Library Fee

This is a required fee for all full- and part-time students on both campuses. Full-time students pay a flat rate. Part-time students pay a per credit hour rate. Fee revenues are used to sustain around the clock hours in Cabell Library, expand hours at Tompkins-McCaw Library, strengthen digital tools and offerings, and generally support operating costs for VCU Libraries.

## 6. Capital Outlay Fee

This is a mandatory fee assessed to all on-campus nonresident students. As required by the State Appropriation Act, revenue from the fee is used to reimburse the Virginia College Building Authority for a portion of the debt service costs attributable to nonresident students on bonds issued under the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Program. In addition, revenue from this fee is used to reimburse the State Treasury Board for costs attributable to nonresident students for the debt service on bond issues used to finance equipment purchases through the Higher Education Equipment Trust Fund (HEETF).

## 7. Room Charge

These fees are paid by all students living in University residence halls. Costs vary by residence hall and room occupancy.

#### 8. Board Plan

Students who live in University residence halls are required to purchase a weekly meal plan. The only exceptions are pharmacy students, graduate students, and students living in University housing with full kitchens. Students may choose from several different plans for the Fall, Spring, and Summer terms. Board plans are also offered to commuter students, faculty, and staff. Costs vary according to each plan.

## 9. Program or Course Fees

A variety of fees separately charged by schools and departments based on a student's enrollment in certain programs and courses. These fees range from a Dentistry Instrument Rental Fee to general application fees and specific course fees in all schools.

#### B. Expenditures

Expenditures are budgeted on a program basis. The program expenditure classifications used in the budget are nationally recognized by colleges and universities. They allow for comparative reporting and are used for analytical purposes. These expenditure classifications are:

#### 1. Instruction

Expenditures of the college, schools, departments, and other instructional divisions of the institution. Expenditures for departmental research and public service that are not separately budgeted are included. Expenditures for both credit and noncredit activities are included, as are general academic instruction, special session instruction, off-campus instruction, medical and dental instruction, and non-credit community education conducted by the teaching faculty.

#### 2. Research

This category includes all funds expended for activities specifically organized to produce research outcomes and commissioned by an agency either external to the institution or separately budgeted by an organizational unit within the institution.

#### 3. Public Service

All funds budgeted specifically for public service and expended for activities established primarily to provide non-instructional services beneficial to groups external to the institution.

#### 4. Academic Support

This category includes expenditures for the support services that are an integral part of the institution's primary mission of instruction, research, or public service. Included are expenditures for libraries, dean's offices, course

and curriculum development, and the dental clinic.

#### 5. Student Services

Funds expended for admissions, registrar activities, financial aid administration, and activities whose primary purpose is to contribute to students' emotional and physical well-being and to their intellectual, cultural, and social development outside the context of the formal instructional program.

#### 6. Institutional Support

Expenditures for the day-to-day operational support of the institution, excluding expenditures for physical plant operations. Included are general administrative services, executive direction and planning, legal and fiscal operations, and public relations/development.

## 7. Operation and Maintenance of Plant

Expenditures for operations established to provide service and maintenance related to the campus grounds and facilities.

## 8. Scholarships and Fellowships

Expenditures made in the form of outright grants, tuition and fee remissions, and trainee stipends to students enrolled in formal coursework, either for credit or non-credit.

#### 9. Auxiliary Enterprises

Self-supporting activities established to furnish goods and services to students, faculty, and staff.

#### 10. Hospital Services

Expenditures made for services in support of the VCU Health System through the Operations and Services Agreement (OSA), the Clinical, Educational, and Research Service Agreement (CERSA), and operation and maintenance services for leased space.

### **Glossary of Student Financial Assistance Terms**

Term	Description
Federal Work Study Program	This federal program is offered to students with a high level of financial need who indicate on their Free Application for Federal Student Aid that they are interested in the work study program. This award allows a student to obtain employment on campus, off-campus at a non-profit agency, or through the America Reads program. Students are paid semi-monthly based on hours worked and must maintain at least half time enrollment.
Pell Grant	This is a federally-funded, need-based, undergraduate grant awarded based on federal guidelines for expected family contribution.
Supplemental Education Opportunity Grant	These federal grants are awarded by the University with preference to students who are enrolled at least half time and who are federal Pell Grant recipients.
Virginia Student Financial Assistance Program - Fellowships	This is state-funded graduate student financial assistance to support graduate education and research through graduate education, with the funds appropriated directly to the University. The amount of the award per student is determined by the University, and the funds may be awarded to Virginia resident and non-resident graduate students.
Virginia Student Financial Assistance Program - Scholarships	This is the state's primary need-based financial assistance program for Virginia undergraduate students. The funds are appropriated directly to the University and allocated to students within state guidelines. These grants are offered to Virginia residents demonstrating financial need and enrolled at least half time.

#### **Glossary of Student Fees**

Advanced Dental Education Fee: This is a fee assessed to post-DDS students, and the revenues are used to offset post-DDS program training costs.

Allied Health Professions Clinical Laboratory Science Fees: These are fees assessed to both full-time and part-time undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in Clinical Laboratory Science programs. The fees are used for laboratory reagents, supplies, personal protective equipment, challenge exams, and clinical rotation laboratory manuals.

Allied Health Professions Clinical Laboratory Science- fee for repeating the Clinical Qualifying Examination: This is a fee assessed to undergraduate students enrolled in the Clinical Laboratory Science program who require a re-take of the Clinical Qualifying exam after one unsuccessful attempt. The fees are used for preparation, copying, and proctoring of the Clinical Qualifying Examination.

Allied Health Professions Department of Occupational Therapy Fees: These are fees assessed to both full-time and part-time graduate students enrolled in the Occupational Therapy program. The revenues are for cadavers, cremation, assistive and instructional technology lab supplies, equipment and maintenance, and field work related instruction.

Allied Health Professions Entry Level Doctor of Occupational Therapy Program Fee: These are fees assessed to both full-time, per semester, and part-time, per credit hour, doctoral students enrolled in the Occupational Therapy Program. Fees are used for cadavers, cremation, assistive and instructional technology lab supplies, equipment and maintenance, field work related instruction, NBCOT Prep Exam, AOTA membership, capstone and doctoral practicum management, Occupational Therapy Education Manager Software and guest lectures.

Allied Health Professions Entry to Practice Doctor of Nurse Anesthesia Practice Program Fee: This is a per semester fee for full-time students, and a per credit hour fee for both major and non-major part-time students. Fees are used for the operational budget of the program to include the new three day anatomy laboratory camp, simulation training, equipment, and supplies.

Allied Health Professions Master of Gerontology Program Fee: This fee is charged to full and part-time graduate students upon initial enrollment in the Master of Gerontology Program. Fees are used to cover costs associated with student clinical/fieldwork related instruction such as preceptor travel to sites, industry speakers, skills assessment and leadership activities as well as costs associated with new accreditation from the National Association of Long Term Care Administrator Boards.

Allied Health Professions Post Professional Doctor of Occupational Therapy Program Fee: This is a per credit hour fee assessed to part-time students. Fees are used for capstone and doctoral practicum management, Occupational Therapy Education Manager Software, and guest lectures.

**Allied Health Professions Program Fee:** This is a required fee for all new MHA graduate students entering on or after Fall 2014 to cover the costs associated with skills assessment, leadership orientation activities, and industry speakers. The fee does not apply to third year students during their residency year enrolled in HADM 694 and 695.

Allied Health Professions Radiation Sciences Fee: This is a fee assessed to undergraduate students enrolled in the Radiation Sciences program. The revenues are used in laboratory and clinical training for items such as gloves, masks, IV fluids and tubing, radioactive sources, immobilization equipment, ECG equipment, and training models.

American Dental Association Fee: This is a fee assessed to all DDS students for required membership in the American Dental Association.

**Board Plans:** Students who live in University residence halls are required to purchase a weekly meal plan. The only exceptions are pharmacy students, graduate students, and students living in University housing with full kitchens. Students may choose from several different plans for the Fall, Spring, and Summer terms. Board plans are also offered to commuter students, faculty, and staff. Costs vary according to each plan.

Capital Outlay Fee: This is a mandatory fee assessed to all on-campus nonresident students. As required by the State Appropriation Act, revenue from the fee is used to reimburse the Virginia College Building Authority for a portion of the debt service costs attributable to nonresident students on bonds issued under the 21<sup>st</sup> Century Program. In addition, revenue from this fee is used to reimburse the State Treasury Board for costs attributable to nonresident students for the debt service on bond issues used to finance equipment purchases through the Higher Education Equipment Trust Fund (HEETF).

*Cooperative Education Fee:* This is a fee charged to all students for each term they are placed in Cooperative Education positions.

**Course Overload Fee:** This is a per credit hour fee for block schedule undergraduate students enrolled in more than 18 credit hours and for graduate students enrolled in more than 15 credit hours per semester. The course overload fee does not apply to first professional programs or other programs that specifically require the student to exceed the applicable maximum number of credit hours.

*Credit by Examination Fee:* This fee is a per credit hour charge for undergraduate students who seek to receive course credit by examination.

**Dental Hygiene Instrument Fees:** These are flat fees charged to dental hygiene students for instrument rental and instrument purchase. The fees collected are used to support the purchase, distribution, sterilization, and storage of all clinical equipment in the dental hygiene program.

**Dental Hygiene Printing Fee:** This is a flat fee charged to first and second year Dental Hygiene students. The revenues are used to support the costs of printing in the student computer lab and production of course syllabi.

**Dental Instrument Fees:** These are flat fees charged to dentistry students for instrument rental and instrument purchase. The fees collected are used to support the purchase, distribution, sterilization, and storage of all clinical equipment in the dental education program.

**Doctor of Nurse Anesthesia Practice Program Fee:** This is a fee charged to all Nurse Anesthesia Program students. The fees are used to cover the costs associated with program administration.

**English Language Program:** Fees are assigned to each student taking individual English language program classes and for application and placement test registration. All revenues are used to support the program. Specific fees include the course fee, application fee, placement test fee, and administrative support fee.

**Foreign Language Lab Fee:** This is a per credit hour fee charged to students enrolled in selected foreign language courses. Revenues are used to defray the language-learning laboratory.

*Freshmen Orientation Program Fee:* This is a fee charged to freshmen students participating in the overnight orientation program. Revenues are used to offset program costs.

Global Education Office English Language Program Fee: This is a per credit hour fee charged to non-native international students who require individual/specific language instruction in order to begin or continue study at a U.S. university. The fee is charged to support ELP faculty, staff, and other GEO operating costs.

*H-1-B Visa Processing Fee:* This is a one-time fee charged to non-U.S. citizens wanting to work at VCU. Revenues are used to support the Immigration Services unit and the Global Education Office.

**Health Administration Professional Masters Program Fee:** This is a fee charged to all Health Administration Executive Masters Program students. The fees are used to cover costs associated with program administration. Non-majors taking courses are assessed a per credit hour charge equal to that paid by majors in the program.

Health Service Fee: This is a required fee for all full-time students on both campuses. Part-time students may participate on an optional basis but must pay the full fee. The health service fee covers unlimited visits to University Student Health Services for the diagnosis and treatment of acute and chronic illnesses. The student health fee does not cover accidental injury and hospitalization. Fee revenues are used to cover operating costs for University Student Health Services.

**Honors College Fee:** This is a fee assessed to any student enrolled in the Honors College. Fee revenues would be used exclusively to help finance co-curricular enhancements including, but not limited to, support for students attending research conferences, support for students engaged in honors study abroad, support to enhance programming for the first-year experience, and support for an honors lecture series.

*Information Systems Knowledge Equivalency Test Out (KET) Fee:* This is an optional fee which allows students to obtain credit by examination for the required INFO 160 course.

**Installment Payment Plan Fee:** This fee is assessed to any student who elects to participate in the University Installment Payment Plan. To participate, the student must have current tuition, fees, dormitory, and board charges of \$100 or greater. The plan distributes the costs for a term into four equal installments. The plan is offered during the Fall and Spring terms only.

Late Payment Fee (on unpaid balances): This fee is assessed to any student whose payment for tuition and fees is not received by the established deadline for each term.

*Library Fee:* This is a required fee for all full- and part-time students. Full-time students pay a flat rate. Part-time students pay a per credit hour rate. Fee revenues are used to sustain around the clock hours at Cabell Library and the new library facility, expand hours at Tompkins-McCaw Library, strengthen digital tools and offerings, and generally support operating costs for VCU Libraries.

*Medical Electives Program Fee:* This fee is assessed to students from other medical schools applying for electives at the School of Medicine. The revenue is used for medical student scholarship support and to offset operating costs directly related to medical electives.

**Medical School Student Government Fee:** This fee is required for all full-time first professional students and students enrolled in the MD/PhD and MD/MHA programs. This fee is in addition to the student government fee and funds an expanded student orientation, a student newsletter, and other events of student interest for the School of Medicine.

**On-line Fee:** This is a per credit hour fee for undergraduate and graduate online courses. This fee is to support the costs in the offices of Online@VCU, Technology Services, and Strategic Enrollment Management. This fee is for operational and personnel support to develop and maintain on-line courses.

**Ph.D.** in **Health Related Science Program Fee**: This is a fee charged to all students in the PhD program. The fees are used to cover costs associated with program administration. Non-majors taking courses are assessed a per credit hour charge equal to that paid by majors.

**Pharmacy Clerkship/Practicum Fee:** This fee is required for all Pharmacy Doctoral students enrolled in the School of Pharmacy. The revenues offset the cost of clerkship site development, expansion, and other costs associated with the practicum experience. A clerkship/placement fee is also assessed to nontraditional PharmD students for the same purpose.

**Pharmacy INOVA Campus Fee:** This is a fee charged to all School of Pharmacy students enrolled on the INOVA Campus in lieu of the University Fee, Health Service Fee and Student Government Fee. This fee supports student recreation, student health, and student counseling programs.

**Pharmacy School Government Fee:** This fee is required for all full-time students enrolled in the Pharmacy Doctoral program in the School of Pharmacy. This fee is in addition to the student government fee and supports conferences, guest lecturers, student activities, and other projects.

**Pharmacy Technology Fee:** This fee is required for all graduate and PharmD students (traditional and nontraditional) enrolled in the School of Pharmacy. The fee directly benefits students through increased access to computers and other instruction-related technology improvements.

*Private Music Lessons Fee:* This is a fee charged to all non-music majors and is used to cover the cost of private music lessons.

**Room Charges:** These fees are paid by all students living in University residence halls. Costs vary by residence hall and room occupancy.

*School of Business Lodging Fees:* The lodging fees are optional and associated with the Executive MBA, Fast Track Executive MS in Information Systems, and MS in Business, Decision Analytics. This fee is a pass through to the designated hotels. It is assessed so that lodging arrangements can be made on the student's behalf.

*School of Business Majors Fee:* This is a required comprehensive fee charged to all full- and part-time School of Business majors. The fee is used to fund programs within the School of Business.

School of Business Master of Supply Chain Management Program Fee: This is a required fee charged to all Supply Chain Management Masters students. The fee is used to support instructional expenses related to the program.

*School of Business Non-Business Majors Fee:* This fee is assessed only to non-business major students who enroll in upper division business courses. Revenue from the fee is used to support instructional costs in the School of Business.

**School of Dentistry Anatomy Fee:** The fee is assessed to first professional dentistry students in their first year only. The fee is used for the purchase and final dispersal (cremation services) of cadavers for anatomy courses.

**School of Dentistry Clinical Component Fee:** Dental students who do not complete their clinical component on time are assessed a fee for each additional month the student requires for completion beyond the expected completion date. The fee is used to cover additional costs associated with the extended use of clinical facilities.

School of Dentistry Clinical Electronic Health Record Laptop Fee: This is a flat fee charged to first year First Professional and Dental Hygiene students, and second year International Dentistry Students during the first semester of entry. The fee covers the purchase of a laptop that will ensure the security of patient data.

**School of Dentistry Clinical Simulation Fee:** The fee is assessed to first professional dentistry students in their first year only. The fee is used to purchase dental supplies and materials, including teeth and equipment, for the mannequin simulation preclinical course.

**School of Dentistry Clinical Support Fee:** This is a flat fee charged to first, second, and third year dental students. The revenues are used to offset the cost of dental supplies and equipment.

**School of Dentistry Clinical Technology Fee:** This is a flat fee charged to all School of Dentistry students. This fee is used to purchase and support the upgraded clinical technology system, as the clinic converts to keep in line with federal initiatives of electronic records, patient and student needs in the work setting.

*School of Dentistry Disability Insurance Fee:* This is a flat fee charged to all School of Dentistry students. The revenues are used to purchase disability insurance policies.

**School of Dentistry Printing Fee:** This is a flat fee charged to first, second, and third year dental students. The revenues are used to support the costs of printing in the student computer lab and production of course syllabi.

**School of Dentistry Remediation Course Fee:** This is a per credit hour fee charged as needed based on the School of Dentistry's requirement for students to remediate a DDS professional program course.

**School of Education Instructional Lab Fee:** This is a fee assessed to students enrolling in selected courses to cover the cost of lab materials.

*School of Education Student Teaching Internship Fee:* This is a fee charged to all graduate students. The revenue is used to pay honoraria to teachers who assist with student teaching.

School of Education TK 20 Student Assessment Fee for Teacher Preparation: This is a fee charged to all graduate students at admission to Teacher Preparation. The revenue is used to support the assessment software used for digital portfolios.

School of Education Assessment Tool Fee: This is a fee assessed to students enrolling in selected courses to cover the cost of assessment software.

*School of Engineering Instructional Lab Fee*: This is a fee charged to students enrolled in instructional lab courses through the School of Engineering.

*School of Medicine Disability Insurance Fee:* This is a flat fee charged to all School of Medicine students. Long-term disability insurance coverage is required for medical students under accreditation guidelines.

School of Medicine Drug Screening Fee: This is a flat fee that covers the cost of drug screening required at matriculation and at the start of the clinical year for Medicine First Professional Students. Drug screening is also required by the hospital for all Masters of Genetic Counseling Students.

**School of Medicine INOVA Campus Fee:** This is a fee charged to all School of Medicine students enrolled on the INOVA Campus. The fee supports student recreation, student health, and student counseling programs.

*School of Medicine – Quantitative Physiology Fee:* This is a flat fee charged to Biomedical Engineering students enrolled in introductory quantitative physiology courses. Revenues are used to offset related supplies and materials costs.

**School of Medicine – Supplemental Simulation Fee**: This fee is charged to all full-time first professional students. The fees collected are used to support equipment, supplies and other associated costs with administering simulation curriculum activity.

**School of Medicine Ultrasound Fee**: This fee is charged to all full-time first professional students. The fee collected are used to support licensing software and material costs

**School of Nursing Bachelor of Science Online Fee:** This is a per credit hour fee charged to Bachelor of Science Nursing students enrolled in online courses. The fee is used to offset expenses related to instruction, supplies, mail, and telecommunications associated with distance learning.

*School of Nursing Clinical Lab Fees:* This is a per credit hour charge for undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in clinical credit courses in the School of Nursing. Revenues are used to defray the cost of clinical courses.

School of Nursing Education Fee: This is a per credit hour charge for undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in the School of Nursing. This fee will not be charged to Nursing students already paying the RN-BS Program Fee. Revenues support instructional and administrative expenses associated with education and clinical placement.

School of Nursing Health Education Systems, Inc. (HESI) Testing Fee: This fee is charged to nursing students in the Traditional and Accelerated BS programs on a semester basis. This fee will cover the costs incurred by the School of Nursing for providing student access to the HESI testing package through the Evolve Testing and Remediation System through a third party provider. The SON requires a standardized testing and remediation system in order to promote student success on the licensure examination upon graduation, and important outcome of nursing programs. This system is not available directly to students and must be contracted through the School of Nursing.

**School of Nursing Microscopy Laboratory Fee:** This fee is charged for the use of the microscope, the microscopy slides containing the variety of organisms and components for disease identification, and the expertise of the microscopy laboratory faculty.

*School of Nursing Program Fee:* This is a fee charged to undergraduate and graduate students enrolled in the School of Nursing. This fee is used to offset the cost of the three day anatomy laboratory camp, simulation training, equipment, and supplies.

**School of Physical Therapy Program Fee:** This is a fee charged to graduate students enrolled in the School of Physical Therapy. This fee is used to offset the cost of the new online clinical performance instrument fee, cadavers, equipment and practice exam for professional license.

School of Social Work Field Education Placement Fee: This is a fee charged to Social Work students for costs associated with field instruction and placement in participating agencies in Virginia, Washington D.C., and neighboring states.

**School of Social Work Off-Campus Student Government Fee:** This is a required fee for all students enrolled in the off-site Social Work program in the School of Social Work. This fee supports conferences, guest lecturers, student activities, and other projects.

**School of Social Work Premium Program Fee:** This is a per credit hour fee charged to each student enrolled in the MSW Distance Education program. The revenues are used to support instructional and administrative expenses with the field education requirement.

*Science Lab Fee:* This is a per course hour fee charged to students enrolled in selected Biology, Chemistry, and Forensic Science courses.

**Student Activity Fee:** This is a required fee for all full-time and part-time Monroe Park Campus students. The fee supports activities scheduled throughout the academic year, such as concerts, plays, student organizations, and publications.

**Student Government Fee:** This is a required fee for all full-time and part-time students on the MCV Campus. This fee supports social, cultural, and other MCV Campus activities.

Student Parking Rates: Students living on or off-campus may purchase parking subscriptions every semester. Special daily rates are also offered to students parking in the West Main Street or West Broad Street decks. The revenues collected are used to pay operating costs for the parking program.

**Student Transcript Fee:** This is a fee assessed to students requesting copies of official transcripts. The revenues are used to cover mailing and processing costs for the transcripts.

**Technology Fee:** This is a required fee for all undergraduate, graduate, and first-professional students on both campuses. The fee is used to provide for a student's technological needs and to support University-wide technological initiatives. Student input is a critical component in determining the use of the revenue derived from the technology fee.

*Transfer Orientation Program Fee:* This is a fee charged to transfer students participating in the orientation program. Revenues are used to offset program costs.

*University College – Campus Learning Center Fee:* This is a fee assessed to freshmen, sophomore, and junior students. The revenue received from this fee will pay for tutors, supplemental instruction leaders, and writing consultants for undergraduates.

*University College – Pre-Health Sciences Advising Credential File Fee:* This is a fee assessed to Pre-med and Pre-dental students using Pre-Health Sciences Advising services. The revenue received from this fee will be used to offset the subscription charged by an outside vendor to transmit credential packets of pre-health students and fund Pre-Health Committee expenses and the Health Expo.

*University Fee:* This is a required fee for all full- and part-time students on both campuses. Full-time students pay a flat rate. Part-time students pay a per credit hour rate. This fee is used by the University to support recreational sports facilities, the Student Commons, campus development, career and counseling centers, student disability and student service center, intercollegiate athletics, and other programs.
